A quick look at the curriculum

We recognise the importance of developing high self-esteem in all children so that they have the confidence to tackle whatever life has to offer. We hope to foster respect for others and a love of the world about them. We are committed to providing an environment that allows children to maximise their potential in all areas of the curriculum.

A programme of meaningful, enjoyable activities, events and experiences support the school's curriculum objectives. Curriculum enrichment takes learning beyond the classroom, to local attractions, museums and businesses.

The children can also use interactive whiteboards and iPads in the classroom to explore and communicate, giving them access to the internet, which they learn to use safely.

Our Learning Journey using ELLI (Effective Lifelong Learning Inventory)

The children use seven different characters called ELLI animals to help them spot ways in which they learn. ELLI is very much part of our everyday language. Walking into each classroom, you may notice an ELLI display or perhaps a set of soft toys. Each term, the children focus on the different learning skills in assemblies and within lessons, so that they become confident learners.

The seven skills are each represented by an animal, they are:

- The Curious Cat Finding out, exploring and asking questions.
- The Busy Bee Working together.
- The Creative Unicorn Being imaginative, finding creative solutions.
- The Wise Owl Thinking strategically.
- The Meaning Making Spider Making Links with prior learning.
- The Changing Chameleon Changing and adapting an approach to learning to improve.
- The Resilient Tortoise Persevering no matter how hard things seem.



A quick look at the curriculum

Staged Induction to School

Our experience has shown us that children benefit from a staged induction when they start their Reception year. To ensure a calm and happy start to their school life, we offer a home visit in early September and then the children attend school in small groups, initially on a part-time basis. All children will be in school full time by the end of September.

Active and fun

A distinctive feature of the school is the wide variety of extra-curricular activities available. In addition to Breakfast and After School Club, outside specialists provide gymnastics, tag rugby, football, mini sports, dance and French, which children can enjoy if they wish.

We are also very proud that the school has achieved the Mayor's Award for Excellence as a Health Improving School. We aim to help children understand how to live healthy lives by eating sensibly, exercising regularly and making healthy choices. To support this, school meals are freshly prepared on the premises with a hot meal or salad bar option available. The children also have fruit snacks in the morning and the afternoon.

Special Educational Needs

Children may, at some stage during their time in school, need specialised teaching because of particular talents or learning difficulties. We prioritise the early identification of children who may require extra support, which is tailored to meet their individual needs.

Transition to the Junior School

Children from Henleaze Infant School are guaranteed a place at the Junior School and both schools work hard to ensure that this transition is as smooth as possible. The Year 2 children have regular visits to the Junior school – for assemblies, playtimes and taster days and individual support is offered to children, if it is needed. Both schools aim to ensure that all children are prepared for the next step of their educational journey.











How parents and carers can get involved

Parents and carers work in partnership with the school in supporting their child's education. As children progress through the school, there are opportunities to assist in the learning of key words and spellings, reading, maths and helping with occasional topic work.

The school benefits hugely from parent volunteers who help out in the classrooms and attend school trips.

In addition, there is the option to join FHIS (Friends of Henleaze Infant School) our Parent Teacher Association. This is an extremely supportive group of people who raise considerable funds for the school; in addition to arranging a variety of social events such as quiz nights and fashion shows for parents to attend. The biggest fund raising events of the year are the Bonfire night firework display and the May Fair – fantastic events that bring together past and current pupils and their families and friends, together with the local community.


