
Starting School - Janet & Alan Ahlberg

A number of children's first experiences are followed in this now classic picture book – from their first day through to the end of the school year. Various emotions are sympathetically explored so every reader can find things to identify with.




Borris starts school - Carrie Weston & Tim Warnes


Harry and the Dinosaurs go to school - Ian Whybrow & Adrian Reynolds


Charlie and Lola: I Am Too Absolutely Small For School - Lauren Child


Topsy and Tim start school - Jean & Gareth Adamson


Come to school too Blue Kangaroo - Emma Chichester Clarke


First day at Skeleton School – Sam Lloyd
