This week schools across the UK have been spending additional time teaching children about healthy relationships as part of the national antibullying week campaign. At our school, we name the week 'Friendship Week' and explore in more depth what it means to be a good friend, what bullying or bullying behaviour is and how to report it. Healthy relationships are core to us living our school value 'community' as well as those of kindness and respect, so teaching on the theme is ongoing throughout the year both explicitly through Personal, Social, Health Education and assemblies as well as through supporting children in their interactions on a day-to-day basis.

In an Infant school, children are only at the beginning of their journey of learning how to interact socially, so require a high level of input. This alongside this age of child also being in the infancy of managing to regulate their emotions independently, does mean that sometimes, things go wrong. You will all be familiar with our Behaviour Policy which sets out the principles by which we seek to understand and manage behaviour. recognising behaviour as a communication of emotion (often 'big' emotions which we know are a challenge for young children to manage), how we teach children about the rules and expectations necessary to support a positive, cohesive environment in a school community; how we reward those who work hard to uphold expectations and how we support change in behaviour through an empathetic and relationships-based approach.

In this policy we outline how we support children (and their families) whose behaviour needs fall outside what we universally offer for all children, whether these stem from trauma, special educational needs, or as is often the case in young children, something we do not yet fully understand. In a recent school and governor review of the Antibullying Policy, we have added further detail of how our school continues this holistic approach to considers bullying and bullying behaviour based on what we know and understand of the age, developmental stage and contextual factors such as SEND or safeguarding. We outline the definition of bullying (as opposed to bullying behaviours) and maintain our 'Zero Tolerance' approach to bullying outlining how we respond to those involved in this form of child-on-child abuse. As you'd expect at the young age of the children we are supporting in our school, this approach focuses on teaching the right way to treat others and working with parents/carers to unpick what the underlying needs of the child/ren are.
